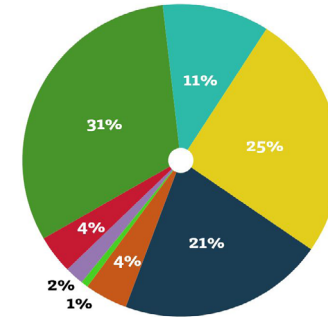
The last six months have been especially challenging, but we are learning and adapting to protect **'The City in the Forest'** for everyone, for generations to come. We look forward to seeing you soon.

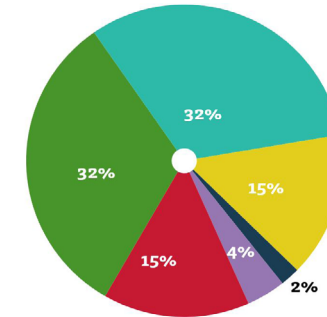

Trees Atlanta is moving! As our organization adapts to serving the needs of an evolving city, our staff size has grown significantly. So much so, that as of early 2020, our teams worked out of three separate offices. While we're grateful for our time in each of these neighborhood locations, we're thrilled to reunite under one roof.

Our planned headquarters will be located in the heart of southwest Atlanta's Oakland City. In addition to housing our administration, program staff, and education operations, the building will accommodate various uses by the surrounding communities. We are actively gathering input from our future neighbors to inform the working design, establishing the best uses for indoor and outdoor spaces. Close proximity to the Atlanta BeltLine Westside Trail encourages public access and alternative commuting options for our team. Construction is tentatively set for winter of 2020 and will continue through 2021. As formal design renderings are completed, we will make them available at treesatlanta.org/newhq.
